

Ferst Foundation and Literacy

Inspired by the success of the Dollywood Foundation program, and in support of this proactive approach to help children achieve success in education and in life, Robin Ferst formed the Ferst Foundation for Childhood Literacy in 1999. Originating in Morgan County, Georgia the goal was established to send the books from Dolly's Imagination Library to every child in Georgia by 2010.

The Foundation strives to improve early childhood learning for every child regardless of income, race, religion, or gender as any child who cannot read is at-risk. Children registered for the Ferst Foundation for Childhood Literacy program receive a book at his/her home every month via U.S. mail until their fifth birthday. If they are registered as soon as they are born, each child will receive up to 60 free books for his/her own personal library!

An expert committee composed of individuals from education, child development, academia and early childhood literacy has carefully selected the books chosen for this home library. The children's classic. The Little Engine That Could, is the first book of each child receives and Miss Bindergarten Gets Ready For Kindergarten is the final "graduation" book that is received when the child turns 5.

As the program focus grew to include parent assistance and additional literacy support items, the Foundation grew into its new name: Ferst Foundation for Childhood Literacy. We continue to send the books from Dolly Parton's Imagination Library in conjunction with enhancements from our second literacy support initiative, Leap Into Books.

Now, in addition to the personal library, each child enrolled in the Ferst Foundation program also receives a "Ferst" library card, a Parent's Guide with tips for the parents on how to read aloud with their child and a coupon for a distinctive, adjustable bookcase (with locomotive and caboose bookends) which is specially designed to become a family heirloom. The newest addition to the Program will include a monthly communication piece, which will provide a book quide, child activity page, and opportunities for local community literacy announcements and sponsor acknowledgement.

New Generations



September is New Generations Month

Katie Ischkin, past president and founder of the Rotary Club of South Metro Minneapolis Evenings. Minnesota, USA, believes in a new approach to Rotary.

Her Rotary club, chartered in June 2010, has already grown to more than two dozen members, including 12 new Rotarians who were recruited in a three-month period. The club has signed up for its first Matching Grant and international service project and has participated in more than 10 community service or hands-on volunteer efforts

Ischkin recently shared her ideas on how to attract young professionals with RI. As a "proud, young, female Rotarian," she is among only 2 percent of club members worldwide under the age of 30, and only 11 percent under 40.

"We need to focus on generating interest in young people for the future success of Rotary," she said. Ischkin advocates a new outlook on membership and a different approach to club structure. As a change management consultant, she said she understands people's fear of change. But she stressed that her approach doesn't mean altering the core pieces of the organization or losing what Rotarians hold dear.

"What does change are what I call surface-level elements," she said. "The pieces that individual clubs have the power to shift and redesign, such as meeting times and locations, program structures, club member involvement, and committee formats."

Ischkin's club meets in the evening and lowers costs by not having meals. And it doesn't hold a traditional meeting every week: The third meeting of the month is a happy hour/networking event at different locations in the city, and the fourth meeting is a hands- on volunteering opportunity.

"We've also accepted that, with a vounger membership, we have a higher rate of turnover, mainly because some members aren't guite settled on the city or their career," she says. "We can't be afraid of inviting members who may leave."

As a result, they may be "on call" with their careers, but they are no less dedicated to service.

Ischkin added that it's important to understand the mindset of the new generation and manage expectations accordingly. Younger people are "always on the go and truly connected," she explained, whether it's through social networking, text messaging, or other means. They face a lot of pressure to be involved in multiple endeavors and to balance work and personal life. As a result, they may be "on call" with their

careers, but they are no less dedicated to service.

"When you're trying to recruit younger members or even sponsor and start a New Generations Rotary club, take time with your club and committee to outline what your expectations are and whether they will align with the younger generation you are trying to attract and work with," she said. "Not every Rotary club can quickly shift gears to attract younger members; it takes time and baby steps."

But for many clubs, she said, "all it takes is opening up your minds and starting to think differently about the future of your club's membership."

"This new approach to Rotary, accomplished through such small changes, can help draw younger members, who will view Rotary as an attractive and worthwhile addition to their ever-growing list of commitments and interests."
